Habitat creation


Replacing monoculture sitka spruce with native broadleaves bringing greater biodiversity

Moss Wood Woodland Management Plan (1)





- Submitted the WMP for approval for Scottish Forestry
- WMP = 3 main parts: Bullochreg, Moss Wood and Tawnich Wood


Bullochreg

- Commissioned planting contractors
- Placed our tree order (Scots Pine and Juniper)
- Works to commence December 2023
- Planting to be undertaken by local Isle of Bute firm

- December groundworks will formalise path layout



Moss Wood area


- Light touch woodland management

- Location of welcome hub (on the Quarry Site)
- Development of path network

Moss Wood Woodland Management Plan (4)



Tawnich Wood area

- Currently sitka spruce planted monoculture ready for harvesting
- To replant with broadleaves and create 'sustainable harvesting' woodland
- Include a second welcome area, paths and recreation



Tawnich Wood Plans

2022-2023

- The Roundhouse has already been built – heroic thanks to Gordon Stevenson, Jessica Herriot and Jim Rodger
- Early stages of Tree Nursery in place
- Next phase is harvesting and replanting

Balnakailly SSSI Old Oak Woodland (1)



- Key objectives is to preserve and enhance woodland quality
- Some limited works permitted path improvements, signage etc.
- Overall scope of works agreed with Nature Scot
- Next phase = implement infrastructure improvements

Key Projects – Off-Grid Huts



2022/2023

- Successful first season (opened from end of May)
- £8,000+ in bookings
- Excellent feedback

Key Projects – Quarry Site (Welcome Hub)



2022/2023

- Quarry site purchased 95% contribution from Scottish Land Fund
- Project proposals developed
- Funding strategy in progress HIE potential investment of £100,000
- Key features:
 - Dedicated off-road car parking for 10-15 cars
 - Welcome hut with information boards
 - Toilets and shower block (to support the huts

Environmental Education

- Strong part of our ethos and key element of the work of Bute Community Forest
- Approach = working with the local schools and nurseries
- Mission is that every child Primary school age and under will get a chance to spend time in the Forest (set to be achieved this year)
- Recognised by funders (£7,500 from Awards for All)
- Future = expand the offer to more of secondary school age

Environmental Education (Autumn – Winter 2023)

- Rothesay Primary (13 visits)
- North Bute Primary (8 visits)
- St Andrew's Primary (21 visits)
- Apple Tree Nursery (10 visits)
- Rothesay Early Years (24 visits)

Total = 187 (including 111 sessions Spring – Summer)

Delivering the Priorities

- Staff complement 1.6 Full Time Equivalent
- 0.6 FTE position fully funded till March 2025 post needs filled
- Continued need to draw in grant funding
 - To deliver the Quarry Site welcome hub
 - To continue environmental education programme & events
- To grow income streams where possible
 - Maintain and increase Hut occupancy & revenue
 - Develop new revenue streams
- Grow capacity through increased voluntary efforts

Accounts

- Full year accounts to end of September 2022 available (also see website)
- Circa £72k 'unrestricted' funds balance at 09/22
- Year-end Sept 2023 accounts under preparation
- 2023 accounts will include remaining sale of timber from larch stand and neighbouring compartments and full costs of felling (final return expected to be in the region of £40k net)
- Forward Business Plan to look consider mix of trading and grant income
